# Garvanza HPOZ to be Extension of Highland Park HPOZ

he Los Angeles City Council voted on September 22, 2010 to expand the existing Highland Park Historic Preservation Overly Zone to include the Garvanza community and to rename it the "Highland Park-Garvanza HPOZ".

The Council vote brings to fruition over ten years of work to finally bring the same protection to

Garvanza that the central Highland Park area has had since 1994. Although the original plan was for a separate HPOZ in Garvanza, the fiscal realities at City Hall are such, that the only way to get the process completed was to combine Garvanza into the existing Highland Park HPOZ under one Board, working with a single city planner.

The process in Garvanza began in 1997 with a successful effort by the

HPHT and the Garvanza Improvement Association to get the City to re-establish Garvanza as a community name after of half century as a portion of the Greater Highland Park community. This was accomplished in November 1997 with the installation of community signs announcing Garvanza. The process then began to get an HPOZ established in Garvanza.

Former 14th District Councilmember Richard Alatorre had started the process with a motion in 1999, but the process stalled until restarted by the current Councilmember, Jose Huizar, and an Interim Control Ordinance (ICO) was established in Garvanza in 2007. The ICO put a temporary hold on building permits within the area until they could be reviewed

to see if they complied with the intent of the future HPOZ.

With the ICO due to expire in October 2010, it was important to have the permanent HPOZ in place before the ending of the ICO could lead to possible demolitions or inappropriate remodeling of historic structures in Garvanza.

There are presently 24 HPOZs in Los Angeles which not only protect the historic structures, but


give them eligibility for the City's Mills Act program, which is a property tax savings contract that is designed to encourage the preservation and restoration of those structures. The Highland Park-Garvanza HPOZ is the largest one in the City of Los Angeles and is the first to include a substantial commercial area as well as the residential neighborhoods.

## Garvanza Book to be Released

rcadia Press is releasing a new book on Garvanza on September 27th, 2010, written by former HPHT President and current board member Charles J. Fisher. This new book is the second the author has written on the area. The Arcadia book on Highland Park has been available since February of 2008.

The new book traces the community of Garvanza from the early Rancho San Rafael to the present day with over 200 photos of the community, many that have never before been published.

A book signing with the author will be held at Figueroa Produce on November 6, 2010, from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m.

### BEING A MEMBER OF HPHT

ccording to Articles 3 and 10 of the bylaws of the HPHT, membership and dues are intertwined. When you are a member in good standing your dues are paid annually by January 1sst and no later than March 31 of a calendar year. Anyone joining after October 1st has membership for the coming calendar year.

Being a member gives you the pleasure of inviting other like-minded individuals to help with the mission of preservation through advocacy and education, and the recognition of those who make a special effort in those areas, as well as helping the board of directors make cogent decisions that are pertinent to our mission.

Coming to a meeting is optional but useful especially because there are many decisions that come the way of the Trust through land use that affects the heritage we all share. Some of the presentations we have had in the calendar year ending in December have dealt with window restoration, interaction with the architect and communications director of Occidental College concerning their building program, results of a master's degree seminar project at Cal Poly Pomona on projected plans for land use affecting the Arroyo Seco River in the area adjacent to Highland

Park, and the Glenmary Stairs temporary mural installation researched and designed by students working with LA Commons and influenced by educational outreach by board members.

We've had to deal with concerns about poor planning for the upgrade on the Arroyo Seco Parkway and the resulting, ongoing battle to save the parkway's status as a national treasure. The specter of inappropriate development in the historic zone surrounding and adjacent to the Metro Gold Line is still looms over our community. Many hours have been spent by a certain number of people as we represent the preservation community of the Arroyo Seco Communities of Northeast Los Angeles at City Council, Commission and Planning and Land Use meetings.

The Awards Ceremony on February 28, 2010, featured 15 award winners that included three businesses that had made a difference in the business sections of Cypress Park, Figueroa Street in the Highland Park HPOZ and the York Valley through adaptive reuse of existing commercial buildings. Several members chose to be present at the 3rd Annual L.A. Heritage Alliance, Heritage Day at Heritage Square Museum and joined in the Music, Poetry and Dance continued on page 4

The Walking Tour Docents continue to engage visitors in the history and culture of the Sycamore Grove area every other month. We've been told it is one of the best that is available. Just the other evening, about 20 members got together at the Hollywood Bowl for the last classical concert of the summer season and were blown away by the beauty of the music of Weber and Stravinsky, and the intertwining of the energetically, lithe acrobatic dance movements of Diavolo and the music of John Adams superbly performed by the world class Los Angeles Philharmonic.

As we go to press, the designation of Garvanza as part of the Highland Park-Garvanza HPOZ, is being discussed and decided upon by the LA City Council, helping to preserve the first town in Northeast Los

Angeles. The hard work and dedication of a number of people has made it possible for this important event to come to fruition.

Charles Fisher has now written two books that tell the story of two of our mission regions, Highland Park and Garvanza. We've been selling Highland Park, the book, after a glorious book signing event 2 years ago, and are planning the book signing event for Garvanza in late October.

# Roadside Architecture of Route 66 in Highland Park *Project Begins: Relight Two Rooftop Signs on Figueroa St.*

he North Figueroa Association (NFA) just received a significant cost-share grant from the National Park Service's Route 66 Corridor Preservation Program to preserve and re-light two important historic rooftop signs—the Highland Theatre and Manning's Coffee Store! Significantly adding to the burgeoning sign/lighting corridor in downtown Highland Park, the preservation project will bring back two rooftop signs.

Highland Theatre sign has over 800 light bulbs that just need bulbs so the landmark sign can be enjoyed after dark. Perched on the top of Las Cazuelas, the Manning's Coffee sign is a metal skeleton, missing its neon and opal glass components; once preserved it can artistically contribute a new "old glow" to the Figueroa sign

corridor.

Signs like these don't get built anymore so preserving these treasures that are part of the business district is vitally important to Highland Park's history. This will help create an authentic sense of place, add to the appeal of visiting and in turn bolster the economy of local businesses. Preservation in action!

With a cash donation of \$1,500 and a bucket more volunteer time help do this preservation project properly, HPHT is a key project partner. But your help is needed too. Soon a fundraising campaign will be underway to raise the rest of the matching money that's needed. Let's all work together to bring back the heritage of Route 66.

# Southwest Museum and Casa de Adobe Update

rreplaceable. These places matter to the history of Los Angeles and especially to the communities of the Arroyo Seco. There is no argument about their place in history yet their future remains uncertain.

Last month, Autry announced two new projects yet neither was to preserve and re-open the Southwest Museum or Casa de Adobes. This seven-year plan is to raise \$75 million for two projects: 1) the purchase and renovation of a site in the City of Burbank to locate an offsite storage for the Southwest Museum collection and 2) the renovation of the Griffith Park museum (Museum of the American West) to create more exhibition space for items from the collection of the Southwest Museum. That means that there are no plans to include the Southwest Museum in their fundraising or operations (other than as a warehouse) for many years to come.

HPHT is working as part of our leadership efforts within the Friends of the Southwest Museum Coalition with Councilmember Huizar on a solution. As you recall, he offered Autry a significant funding package to rehabilitate and re-open the Southwest Museum as a museum in early 2010. They passed and/or were not interested in this positive solution that could have been well over \$20 million and would have fully implemented the Brenda Levin Rehabilitation Plan's conclusions for a museum use.

Looking forward, HPHT will continue to have our education and advocacy voices out there and need each of you to help protect these irreplaceable resources who've contributed to our very own identity and cultural value of the entire region and the City beyond.
