

### Community Garden at the Southwest Museum

n Monday, September 10, 2012, the Highland Park Heritage Trust Board of Directors welcomed Barbara Arvi, Program Director of the American Indian Families Partnership, located on North Figueroa Street in Highland Park, who presented an overview of a community based program that she is managing in the garden area of the Southwest Museum.

Barbara spent many, many years as Education Director at the Southwest Museum. She knew that the garden was not being cared for and had the potential for educating Urban Indian families about healthy alternatives in food selection and preparation. She was able to establish a Memorandum of Understanding with the Autry National Center, for an area of the garden at the top of the Hopi Trail in order to grow vegetables and educate families in response to obesity, diabetes and health problems prevalent in the Indian community.

Two days a week, Wednesday mornings from 10AM to noon and Saturdays from 11 AM to 12:30 PM, with the assistance of UCLA students and a few volunteers from the community organizations in the Arroyo Seco, planting, cultivating and harvesting of crops grown in the garden that Barbara knows so well, is being done.

"So, show up to help", introduce yourself to Barbara and the families and others with whom she is working, show that there is community support for activities at the Southwest Museum, and enjoy!

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
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## Picnic Potluck to Celebrate HIGHLAND PARK HERITAGE TRUST'S 30th Anniversary Celebration & Member Appreciation

#### Entertainment, Creative Performance and Tourism: the City of LA – Cultural Institutions along the Arroyo Seco Parkway

y thesis followed an internship I did last year for Highland Park Heritage Trust, during which I collected data for 40 distinct places of tourist interest located along the Arroyo Seco Parkway for the US Service Scenic Byway Grant. In my thesis I described the Arroyo Seco Parkway not only as an important link between tourist attractions like museums, galleries and restaurants, but also as the tourist attraction itself.

Taking as a starting point the fact that modern tourists look for new types of experiences, I analyzed how a drive along one of the oldest parkways in the United States, surrounded by beautiful landscapes and historic buildings, can perfectly meet their need to be involved with their experiences. Next I explained how, from a tourist's point of view, another important distinction of the Arroyo Seco Parkway leads to a variety of the destinations along it. Starting from either the well known Downtown LA scene or Old Town Pasadena, Highland Park, can be considered as part of an element in the beginning of a new "tourist life cycle."

We are not speaking about mass tourism, but sustainable tourism, involving travelers who are interested in natural and cultural resources. Many different studies in the last few years have demonstrated how from an "entertainment tourist destination", known almost exclusively for the movie industry, the city of Los Angeles is becoming a growing arts and cultural destination with the opening of new, successful sites. In this perspective Highland Park has a very good potential, considering the many cultural activities and events that take place in the area during the year that can be promoted not only to the community but to the tourist market, as well.

Based on the concept of tourists who seeks new experiences, I used the last portion of my thesis to create scenarios for five different themed itineraries along the Arroyo Seco Parkway, history, modern art, sport, nature, and movie locations in order to reach different tourist targets. Considering that the base of the construction of itineraries stands in the creation of connections between different attractions, I enlightened the ability of Highland Park to generate "cultural networks," like MOTA (Museums of the Arroyo Day), and, consequently, to offer something more than the classical "LA tourist cliché." In the last chapter of the thesis I described how, with good connections between the attractions, the foundation of an interpretive center that can be an information office too, and maybe a model of sustainable hospitality, Highland Park will have the right credentials to become part of a real tourist system that "sends" tourists who choose Olvera Street as an L.A. history destination at the beginning of the day are directed to "continue their experience" by taking the Gold Line from historic Union Station to Heritage Square, Lummis Home, the Figueroa corridor for lunch, and on to South Pasadena, or Old Town Pasadena, for supper and shopping.

I exchanged many excited and informative email messages for a year before I was able to assist Marta in obtaining the blessing of her advisor to come as the HPHT Summer Intern in June of 2011.
