Founding Board Member Frank Parrello

Little did Frank know that the day he started walking the streets of Highland Park to record historic resources, that he would be where he is today.

Frank graduated from the University of Michigan, School of Architecture, where his instructors were mostly post-war architects who taught, with few exceptions, about ancient monuments, and perhaps the work of Frank Lloyd Wright. Old buildings that did not follow

the modernist teaching "form follows function" should be bulldozed to make way for the "Future."

In 1979, he was asked by LA City Councilwoman Peggy Stevenson's Deputy, Sal Altamirano, to be part of a group of community residents that were working with the East Los Angeles Community Union (TELACU) (http://telacu.com/telacu-story/our-history/) to survey historic buildings in Highland Park.

While his attitude toward "old buildings" had already started to diverge from his earlier instruction, Frank discovered a group of community advocates that taught him the importance of local landmarks. Thanks to his involvement with these community members and professionals, he learned to fully appreciate all forms of architecture and what these buildings said about the times in which they were created, and the people who created them. Not only had his outlook changed as to what was significant architecture, he joined together with these now-likeminded people working to preserve

these buildings with the formation of Highland Park Heritage Trust in 1982.

Changes in his life did not stop there. It was at an HPHT meeting that Frank met Heather Hoggan, who would become his wife. He would also make a major career change when in 1999, after working for the City of Los Angeles Planning Department for 25 years, he was asked to join the prestigious architectural preservation firm, Historic Resources Group as

their Director of Planning.

Frank and Heather now live in Eagle Rock, and Frank has continued his community preservation work with the Eagle Rock Valley Historical Society and was instrumental in the restoration of the entry doors at the Lummis Home. He also was an invaluable consultant to the Relighting the Historic Signs of Figueroa Street project, which restored the Highland Theatre sign and the Mannings Coffee Store sign.



Highland Park Heritage Trust Bi-Annual Community Preservation Awards for 2015-16

Highland Park Heritage Trust has a reputation for recognizing a wide range of buildings, murals, gardens, special neighborhood people and efforts that are indicative of the preservation ethic of our Arroyo communities.

By celebrating the actions taken by our residents to improve the historic heritage of the communities of the Arroyo Seco, we give deserved recognition and honor to those that best match our mission.

All nominations need to be exterior based as the restoration of the façade, or have the ability to be experienced by the general public in some tangible manner such as in a website or event or actions of an individual.

Each year a community minded group of member volunteers form an **Awards Committee** that will be reviewing the nominations and then visiting locations to determine award recipients. By sending in your nominations as soon as possible you will aid this much valued group of dedicated individuals to complete this activity.

The Bi-annual Awards Ceremony will take place in the spring of 2016, on a date and at a location and time to be announced by the committee in October 2015.

Deadline for Nominations, Wednesday, December 16, 2015.

Suggested Criteria - Please use these specific criteria in reference to your nominations

- There is evidence of significant exterior improvement and preservation of this property in the last year (home, residence, commercial property, historic, non-historic).
- 2. There is evidence of continued/sustained maintenance and care of this property.
- 3. There has been preservation, improvement or maintenance of the garden or landscape.
- 4. There has been a significant contribution by an individual or organization toward the preservation of our cultural heritage.
- 5. There has been a significant contribution by virtue of the impact on the preservation community because of this activity or event.

Washington, Hermon, Montecito Heights and Cypress Park.
