## Temple Beth Israel, Celebrating 90 Years

n March 30, 2014, Temple Beth Israel of Highland Park and Eagle Rock (TBI) will be honored by the Highland Park Heritage Trust (HPHT), a well-known preservation organization. HPHT's Bi-Annual Community Award Ceremony will be held at the temple to recognize several honorees including TBI.

In conjunction with the awards ceremony, TBI will present an historical exhibit that will pay tribute to people and events in the 90 years since the founding of the congregation (originally known as the Highland Park Hebrew School Association). This wonderful event is expected to have a large turnout with both organizations' members in attendance, along with the public, government officials, and the press.

The exhibit pieces will pay homage to the people and events at TBI over the years. These pieces will represent one (or more) of three TBI exhibit themes: 1) Oasis, 2) Jewish Experience, and 3) Tikkun Olam. The "Oasis" is in reference to the temple's status as an outpost to Jewish Los Angeles and yet is unique in its own right, including its architecture. The "Jewish Experience" refers

to its flexible, hamishe atmosphere that allows its congregants, clergy, and friends to develop, implement, and take in meaningful TBI activities (be they spiritual, religious, educational, social activism, ethnic cuisine, or cultural). The "Tikkun Olam" is where the temple and/or separately its congregants have helped to "repair the world" and do "mitzvot". There will be a time line of key milestones throughout the 90 years, as well as recognition of the temple's effort to landscape in a sustainable manner and create an Exodus Garden.

TBI is a "do-it-yourself" temple that relies heavily on volunteers (whether those individuals are members or not), therefore the exhibit will also depend on information and photos that members and community may have available. Temple Beth Israel looks forward to working on this in a collaborative and expeditious manner.

very January, the Board of Directors reviews the programmatic and organizational needs of the previous twelve months and identifies the initiatives the organization will take on over the upcoming twelve months. With the holidays now behind us and the 2014 Board in place, we are ready to get to work. I would like to thank our out-going Board members – Nicole Possert, Linda Phelps, and Linda Miller for their hard work and dedication on the Board over the many years. Their experience, passion, and commitment to the community have had significant influence on how HPHT operates and serves our community. I would like to also welcome Harvey Slater and Ronald Rocha to our 2014 Board. They have each expressed interest and are committed to the work that we do to accomplish our mission. I look forward to working with them and our existing Board to get our initiatives accomplished throughout the year.

This year marks an important time for preservation in our Northeast community. First, we have SurveyLA coming to NELA in the Fall. This survey is the City's first comprehensive citywide program to identify significant historic resources throughout the city. Although we have the Highland Park/Garvanza Historic Preservation Overlay Zone (HPOZ) - the largest HPOZ in the entire city, SurveyLA will not be considering those properties that fall within the HPOZ since they were surveyed during the creation of the historic district in the early 1990s and the Garvanza expansion in 2010. It has been at least 20 years since the initial survey was adopted and many properties that were not identified then are waiting to be recognized today.

A lot has happened in our neighborhoods in the past 20 years - to list a few, there has been a noticeable increase of property renovations and restorations, involvement and pride in our neighborhoods by residents and businesses, and the fact that our mid-century architecture is now over 50 years old. Since the survey will skip the HPOZ, there are many properties within and outside of the HPOZ that merit inclusion in the survey. Other exciting news to share - the Southwest Museum and the Arroyo Seco Branch Library are both celebrating their 100 year anniversary this year. This is a big milestone for each of our treasures. Please look forward to more information on these and other significant icons in the coming months. Additionally, we will be launching our new website, archiving over 30 years of HPHT material, and entering into a new phase for our shared project of archiving and digitizing NELA newspapers dating back to the early part of last century.

Thank you for your continued support of the Highland Park Heritage Trust. The hard work and dedication of our membership and board members is greatly appreciated, and I am proud to work with everyone by promoting and advocating the story of our community.


#### **Highland Park Historical Cultural Monuments & Preservation Plan**

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
