

A Big Year Ahead at HPHT

The Heritage Trust board met in January for our annual Planning Session and had a productive luncheon meeting, hosted by Board Members JJ Jackman and Eric Magallon in their charming, historic home in Garvanza. We looked back at last year's initiatives and can report successful completion on many fronts. ... Some highlights include substantial completion of preliminary work on the HPHT Archiving Project. With Occidental College's assistance we were able to complete the survey of 35 years of HPHT documents. As the HPHT Archive Committee continues working to conserve these informative items we are focusing on best practices and ways to engage others in the use of our archival materials. We are also pleased to report that a new Figueroa walking tour has been added to our HPHT education and outreach offerings (see article this issue). In several areas we resolved to work harder and more effectively where we fell short. With our Lummis Home advocacy we succeeded in gathering nearly 1000 signatures in support of the Lummis Home but now need to work more effectively to reach the ears and eyes of our elected leaders to help move the needle on the historic home.

For 2018 we have identified the following Initiatives – some new and some rolled over where we still have work to do.

- 1) **35th Anniversary Celebration at the Abbey San Encino** (March 18, see flyer this issue) and other events thru the year (Fall 2017 thru Fall 2018)
- 2) Advocacy for NELA Cultural Resources SW Museum/ Casa and Reignite the Lummis Home Initiative
- 3) Membership and Marketing Grow membership, member participation and visibility of HPHT in the Community
- Activism work with community members to nominate the Prebbles Coffee Shop (AKA IHOP in Cypress Park) + Chicano Arts Collectives on Figueroa
- 5) **Sustained Fundraising** work on creating a yearly signature fundraising event(s) to support our Preservation Activities
- 6) **Refocus the conversation on Historic Preservation** a yearlong dialog. Where has the Preservation movement been and where is it going? Are there particular needs and/or opportunities in our Arroyo communities that HPHT should be addressing?




Tours are every half hour beginning at 10:30 a.m. Last tour is 3:00 p.m.

Proposed SB 827 - What is it all about?

The Heritage Trust and many of our sister Historic Preservation Non-Profits in Los Angeles and State wide are monitoring and responding to the recent State Bill 827 sponsored by CA State Senator Scott Weiner, District 11 San Francisco. The Bill is also known as "Planning and Zoning: Transit Rich Housing." Simply put, the Bill is described as a reaction to our State's housing crisis and proposes to increase housing height and density along bus and subway lines via up-zoning properties along transit corridors. Furthermore, the Bill states, "The bill would exempt a project awarded a housing opportunity bonus from various requirements, including maximum controls on residential density or floor area ratio, minimum automobile parking requirements, design standards that restrict the applicant's ability to construct the maximum number of units consistent with any applicable building code, and maximum height limitations, as provided."

The Bill, which has yet many future iterations, is of

real concern to Preservationists. SB 827 in its first draft appears to be a top-down planning initiative that would seek to minimize the will of local communities and would give developers more control; the Bill makes no reference to CEQA, our state law that protects Historic Resources; and SB 827 would possibly exempt developers from design standards that would restrict density. All of these proposed changes would run counter to the protections instituted by our HPOZ and Highland Park Heritage Trust's 35 years of preservation advocacy and achievements.

Stay tuned and stay vigilant! HPHT will be working with our sister organizations to craft a coordinated response to the proposed SB 827. We will reach out to all of our members soon.
