

ur theme may have been "Celebrating 35 Years," but the resounding chorus was the statement above. The HPHT 35th Anniversary event was a HUGE success, in no small part due to the splendid location where it took place – the historic Abbey San Encino in Highland Park. Built in the 1920s by printer/

typographer Clyde Brown, the Abbey is now owned by Clyde's grandson Severin Browne, who graciously allowed the Trust to take over the property on Sunday, March 18th. The event offered a full day of tours, food, music and art.

The artisan fair set up in the front garden of the property featured several local artists, among them the Urban Sketchers, offering live demonstrations – blacksmithing from Adam's Forge and glass making by Glass Studio. In addition, several artists were working live on site throughout the day – painting, sketching and drawing the Abbey and its surroundings. Attendees spent the day enjoying docent-led tours of the Abbey, watching the

demonstrations, bidding on an incredible array of silent auction items and listening to live music provided by the fantastic Meshugah Canes, LA's premier ukulele group, and by the lovely guitar-and-vocalist duo Verossaraptor.

Another highlight of the day was welcoming Suzanne

Lummis, who read from a recently published poetry chapbook put together by students at Occidental College under the tutelage of Myka Kielbon. Suzanne and Severin spoke briefly about the history of the area and the Abbey – the occasion was historic in that it was the first meeting of these two famed grandchildren of two of the most famous

names in the Arroyo Seco's history, Charles Lummis and Clyde Browne. Louisa Van Leer mused, "witnessing Suzanne Lummis and Severin Browne meet for the very first time in the gardens of the Abbey San Encino and wonder aloud if their Grandpa's were friends...hope that leads (to) more conversations! Perhaps next time we can invite Severin to the Lummis Home..."


For his generosity in opening his home to our celebration, HPHT also awarded Severin Browne with a lifetime membership to the Trust.

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

- **Sunday, June 3:** Sycamore Grove Park, 4702 North Figueroa Street, Sycamore Grove/Highland Park, 12 noon-7:00 pm. Music, dance, theatre, puppets and many family activities, including robot demonstrations, crafts tables and soccer games organized by the Anahuak Youth Soccer Association.
