Grease: It Happened Here

Forty-one years after its release the movie *Grease* is an even bigger deal. Sing-a-longs and stage revivals are popping up all over the world. And who can forget the "hand jive" scene with Danny Zuko (John Travolta) and his ex-girlfriend, Cha Cha DiGregorio (Annette Charles), the "Best Dancer at St. Bernadette's"? It's a number that resonates across the generations.

Cha Cha DiGregorio played another important role in *Grease*: she waved her kerchief to start the drag race in the Los Angeles River. The image of Cha Cha's raised arms has cemented the riverbed forever in minds around the world. It also earned Cha Cha her own Barbie doll in 2008.

Annette Charles danced and starred in many other movies, but, perhaps most importantly, spent many years teaching at California State University, Northridge in the Chicano Studies Department. When she died in 2011 after a battle with cancer, media outlets around the world took note including NPR, CBS, and *People*.

Less known is that
Annette Charles was born
Annette Cardona, and lived
near the intersection of North
Figueroa Street and West
Avenue 26 in Cypress Park
until she was four. Four gas
stations and an aging strip
mall awaiting redevelopment
now flank the corner. But it
once was dotted with single

family and multiple unit dwellings until the 110 and 5 freeways intervened.

Some residents want to name the intersection of N. Figueroa Street and Avenue 26 in Cypress Park in Cardona's honor. They say it's an important reminder of Cypress Park's unsung contributions as well as the impact the freeways and their construction had on the neighborhood. They also like that Cardona's Italian and Mexican heritage represents an important transition in Cypress Park's immigrant history.

Charles's mother, Mary, still lives in the Elysian Valley, suggesting more opportunities to remember this NELA pioneer.

n July 25, 2019, Architect Louisa Van Leer, accompanied by her husband Rodney Asher and Garvanza Homeowners' Association's Rosa Rivas and Tina and Charles Miller will be present at the Los Angeles Conservancy Luncheon to receive a well-deserved award in preservation.

HPHT was delighted to nominate the three-parcel residential rehabilitation/ infill project for "Preserving Historic Fabric while Increasing Density in the Highland Park-Garvanza HPOZ." This nomination honored 10 years of persistence to find the right buyer for the A.V. Walberg House and adjoining properties at the intersection of N Avenue 66 and Crescent Street in the Highland Park-Garvanza HPOZ.

Louisa, in preparing the nomination on behalf of HPHT indicated, "What we have found at the HPHT is that great preservation is often the result of a collective effort of public and private citizens, sometimes spanning years of advocacy work in order to get results."

Garvanza Improvement Association has never wavered in its quest to represent their community.

Highland Park Heritage Trust has a reputation for recognizing a wide range of buildings, murals, gardens, special neighborhood people and efforts that are indicative of the preservation ethic of our Arroyo communities.

By celebrating the actions taken by our residents to improve the historic heritage of the communities of the Arroyo Seco, we give deserved recognition and honor to those that best match our mission.

All nominations need to be exterior based as the restoration of the façade, or have the ability to be experienced by the general public in some tangible manner such as in a website or event or actions of an individual.

Each year a community-minded group of member volunteers form an Awards Committee that will be reviewing the nominations and then visiting locations to determine award recipients.

By sending in your nominations as soon as possible you will aid this much-valued group of dedicated individuals to complete this activity.

Criteria

Please use these specific criteria in completing your nominations on the form:

- 1. There is evidence of significant exterior improvement and preservation of this property in the last year (home, residence, commercial property, historic, non-historic).
- 2. There is evidence of continued/sustained maintenance and care of this property.
- 3. There has been preservation, improvement or maintenance of the garden or landscape.
- 4. There has been a significant contribution by virtue of the impact on the preservation community because of this activity or event.
- 5. There has been a significant contribution by an organization or individual toward the preservation of our cultural heritage.

Compass Rose at Oxy Arts Complex

The Compass Rose exhibition consists of a large-scale stained glass installation by artist artist Debra Scacco based on a deconstructed map of Northeast Los Angeles, a large-scale artist book, inspired by the historic Sanborn Fire Insurance Atlas, redrawn to reflect the memories of the community, audio interview clips, and the opportunity to listen to or read each of the interviews in full.

The project was a unique year-long collaboration launched by Oxy Arts, the College's community based arts hub, bringing together multiple departments at Occidental College in collaboration with 31 community members.

Open through August 16, Compass Rose confronts the singular lens of the original map: undoing its finality, and celebrating the deep connections that make a collection of streets a community.

Preserving the Natural Environment

On Tuesday, July 5, three stalwart HPHT members, Keiko Miller, Erica Wilder and Carmela Gomes, attended the quarterly meeting of the Arroyo Seco Foundation at the Pasadena Central Library. Founder and managing director, Tim Brick, presented experts who explained the process being employed to confront the way in which LA County Flood Control managing the "Big Dig" program.

The last presenter was attorney Mitchell Tsai said, "It is a good day for the Arroyo Seco," after Judge James C. Chalfant's stinging tentative decision in favor of the Arroyo Seco Foundation and Pasadena Audubon Society in their lawsuit against County Flood Control's Big Dig sediment program in Hahamongna Watershed Park. Settlement discussions are now underway for a July 30th hearing.

"We have never opposed the County Flood Control District's sediment removal from Hahamongna Watershed Park. The Arroyo Seco Foundation has been urging the Flood District to do a slow, steady sediment management program for more than thirty years. The County's irresponsible delay of their maintenance responsibility has necessitated the Big Dig and compounded its negative impacts.

We only sought a safe, careful plan, but as the trucks

begin to roll and the grinders and excavator dig deep into the Arroyo Seco streamzone, it is now apparent that the Flood Control District has failed on that score too.

We urge those who love Hahamongna to not forget its importance and to redouble your efforts to help restore it for future generations." https://www.arroyoseco.org/
